Self-Assessment for Volunteering as a Team with Intermountain Therapy Animals

Thanks for your interest in Intermountain Therapy Animals and in volunteering with your animal. In our 22 years working with animal-assisted interactions, we have come to realize that it is a complex and demanding kind of volunteering—but it offers incalculable rewards for those people and animals who are well-suited for it. For example, people are often surprised at the commitment required—both in time and finances. And they are also often surprised that, while all pets are marvelous personal and family therapists, very few actually desire to provide this service to strange people in strange places on a regular basis.

Take this self-assessment to determine if both you and your animal are ready to proceed. Please plan to bring your completed assessment with you if you decide to come to our offices for an interview.

Unlike many kinds of volunteering, there are fees associated with becoming a registered therapy animal team because of the extensive training and education required. They include:

- Handler Course: \$95
- Vet visit to complete the Animal Health Screening Form: \$60-300
- Team test: \$30
- Registration Fee/Annual dues to Intermountain Therapy Animals: \$75

You will also need to re-test with your partner every two years, including an updated veterinary health screening and evaluation.
