INTERMOUNTAIN THERAPY ANIMALS

We are a human service organization, a 501(c)(3) Utah nonprofit, that brings the gifts of animal companionship and interaction to people in need. Our mission is to enhance quality of life through the human/animal bond. Our volunteers (people and their own pets) make regular visits to those who are physically or developmentally disabled, emotionally or psychologically impaired, lonely or suffering from depression.

ITA therapy animals and their handlers are screened, trained, licensed and insured to participate in animal-assisted interactions (AAI), which range from casual and informal to rigorous, goal-driven aspects of formal therapies. Successful teams have completed both health and temperament screening and volunteer training.

Serving our communities since 1993, we are one of the largest groups of our kind in the United States, with more than 300 volunteer teams visiting at more than 170 hospitals, counseling centers, nursing facilities, detention homes, extended care centers, and schools. Chapters of ITA also thrive in Montana.

In addition, 18 of our colleague groups in 10 other states have now adopted ITA's training and testing protocols.

The value of our therapy animals' interventions has been proven and endorsed for more than 30 years.

Therapy animals are catalysts and motivators. They offer love, hope, comfort, joy, normalcy—and fun, when all those qualities are in short supply.

Animal-assisted therapy can significantly reduce pain, anxiety, depression and fatigue in people with a range of health problems. Some examples:

- · People receiving cancer treatment
- People in long-term care facilities
- People with cardiovascular diseases
- · People with dementia

he increasing costs and prices throughout our economy have been especially harsh for nonprofit organizations, including ITA.

We are pleased to be holding on and keeping up despite the many challenges. Some significant happenings during 2024 include:

- We reached almost 320,000 clients, with hours served by our ITA volunteer teams totaling about 22,560.
- We changed our longtime tagline, "Pets helping people," to "Healing Connections."
- Our major 2024 fundraiser, "Paws in Wonderland," held at the beautiful Zions Technology
 Centered, earned us more than \$100,000 for the very first time.
- · Our very popular airport teams were invited to

be filmed and included in a new production by National Geographic magazine called "Airport Lost & Founds." The decision to include therapy animals was spontaneous, as the fim crew was so taken with the dogs and their stress-reducing capabilities.

- ITA and our teams were featured in *Slug* and *Utah Stories* magazines, and in several TV appearances throughout the year.
- Gifts to ITA on Giving Tuesday 2024 totaled \$10,340.
- While we held somewhat less training classes for new teams, in an attempt to control our growth, nevertheless we fulfilled a record number of requests for presentations and events throughout Utah. (See page 7.)



his past year, 2024, has found ITA up to our eyeballs in requests for our teams. We are serving more than 170 health care and educational facilities, with more than 40 still on our waiting list.

There is no longer any doubt, at any level, about the efficacy and healing benefits of animals. Staff personnel at all facilities are still pressuring us most of all for visits, and we are so happy to be able to lighten their burdens by offering the chance to interact with our animals.

In our chosen endeavor, ITA remains on the front lines, always seeking to learn more and do even better for all parties who participate in our animal-assisted interactions — client, staff, family, handler and animal. We currently have 18 colleague organizations in 10 other states who use ITA's training and testing protocols.

Jane Goodall has said that "If we can take an animal as a true partner and learn from the animal, who will then learn from us — a back and forth relationship — it can lead in the future to all kinds of amazing and innovative ways of helping the world become a better place." We humans have always expected our animals to learn from us, but it's a more recent bit of enlightenment that they have much to teach us, as well, and we are committed to staying open in that process of discovery.

We remain permanently committed to staying personal, too, despite the relentless advance of the technologies that are disconnecting our society. We will always choose personal interaction over automation, even when that choice may seem "inefficient." We are also committed to being open and direct when dealing with issues and solving problems. We never fail to be dazzled by how quickly disagreements melt away when people speak to one another directly instead of speculating sideways. We have observed that this is another simple but powerful way that animals are great role models.

I am personally so proud of our very small and committed staff. They are all dazzlingly competent, creative and hard-working, and they produce more good with less resources than any group or organization I know.



The R.E.A.D.® Program ~ Growing for 25 Years



ntermountain Therapy Animals' animal-assisted education program, R.E.A.D.* (Reading Education Assistance Dogs*), introduced in December of 1999, celebrated 25 years in 2024, as it-continues to inspire children and gratify their parents and school and library personnel, across the U.S. and beyond.

The impact on children's education at all levels, due to the pandemic, has been huge and debilitating. We now know that the U.S. ranks 125th among the countries of the world for children's literacy. Our R.E.A.D. programs were among the last to be reinstated because schools faced such difficulties.

The reading scores continue to be discouraging and below previous norms, but our R.E.A.D. teams have not given up. We have sold the R.E.A.D. training package to people all over the world, and registered more than 7,500 therapy teams to offer the program. Beyond the United States, there are 29 other countries (see flags above) where the program is flourishing. The R.E.A.D. manual has already been translated

into Russian, Kazakh, Spanish and Portuguese, and Japanese.

Our trained, licensed network of R.E.A.D. program instructors currently numbers 62, and we have 79 official R.E.A.D. affiliate groups in 35 states.

Competing theories about the optimal way to educate our children will no doubt continue to be discussed, because each individual's learning style is different. But one thing we know for sure, after 25+ years, is that no matter what methods are used, having a dog by one's side makes the experience more motivating, more beneficial, more fun, and ultimately more successful.

We learned very early that the R.E.A.D. experience is about so much more than acquiring reading skills like fluency and comprehension. R.E.A.D. dogs help in many other significant ways, by relieving chronic stress, building confidence, improving class participation, and letting children fall in love with books and reading.

Organizational Reach/Impact in 2024

The greatest healing power of our animal-assisted interventions occurs during one-on-one encounters with each patient/client. Taken together, they are a mighty force for improvement in physical, mental and emotional health. With 340 teams at 170+ healthcare and educational facilities, here is the recent sum total of our visits:


- 7 team training class series

Throughout our communities, we:

- provided stress relief for students, employees, first responders and others on 31 occasions
- · made 15 educational presentations to community groups and students
- Our teams participated in 92 other events
- And, we held 10 fundraising events


The University of Utah Burn ICU lets everyone know that therapy dogs are welcome!
